- Thesis Title: Nest-Site Selection and Neonate Survival of Eastern Box Turtles (*Terrapene carolina carolina*) in Michigan's Northern Lower Peninsula
- Thesis Committee: Dr. Jennifer Moore (Chair) Department of Biology, Dr. Paul Keenlance – Department of Biology, and Dr. Alexandra Locher – Department of Biology

Joseph's thesis research focused on nest site selection and neonate survival in eastern box turtles. Turtles are declining globally, and knowledge gaps currently hinder our ability to effectively manage and recover these populations. Joe's thesis addresses an important question for the viability of a species that is of conservation concern in Michigan. Broadly speaking, his research is important for conservation biology and management. The Biology Graduate Committee has evaluated Joseph's thesis and found it to be excellent.

During his tenure at GVSU, Joseph has turned into an excellent communicator. His excellence in written communication is evident in his thesis. He has managed to communicate complex topics in an effective and understandable way. The faculty of the Biology Department have no doubts that Joseph's thesis will ultimately be published in high quality scientific journals, with minimal editing prior to submission. This is a testament to the quality of the science and the writing.

Joseph's abstract appears on the following page.

ABSTRACT

Turtles (Order Testudines) are experiencing global declines largely due to anthropogenic influences such as habitat fragmentation, illegal collection and sales, and the threat of global climate change. Removal of individuals from the adult age-classes means there is now a greater need to understand the survival of neonate and juvenile turtle age-classes. In this study I examined a population of eastern box turtles (Terrapene carolina carolina) at the northern limit of their range in Michigan's lower peninsula. The objectives of my thesis were 1. to determine the microhabitat factors that influence nest site selection by female box turtles and how selected microhabitat and environmental factors affect box turtle nest success and 2. create known-fate annual survival estimates for hatchling box turtles through the first year of life. Box turtles select nest sites with a higher percent of bare soil and lower amounts of understory vegetation compared to random sites and avoid nesting on north facing slopes. Larger clutch sizes as well as a lower percent of bare soil at the nest site increased the probability of nest success. Depredation and exposure to suboptimal environmental conditions were the primary sources of neonate mortality from 2013-2015, and annual survival estimates for neonate box turtles predicted survival to decrease through the first year of life with a steep drop in the probability of survival from nest emergence in the fall, before leveling off at 50% for overwintering (day 50 = .503; SE = 0.067), then gradually decreasing again with spring emergence till reaching 0% survival short of the 1 year mark (day 335 = 0.0). Similar studies should be conducted across the geographic range of Eastern Box Turtles to better understand the major threats to the survival of other box turtle populations.

Kylie excelled throughout her graduate program and played a leadership role in the Health Professions Graduate Student Alliance. For her final 'project' – the preparation of a journal quality research paper – she started with a team project focused on process improvement in a breastfeeding initiative at a local hospital. Her paper, *Breastfeeding America*, describes the known benefits of breast feeding overall, and then investigates the evolution and impact of infant formula and cow's milk on a mother's ability to breastfeed and on the cognitive and physical development of children. She also tracks how these trends in the US have influenced other countries and addresses the challenges of creating a culture of breast milk utilization.

Matias Gil, Master of Science in Computer Information Systems

- Project Title: Using a smartphone to help improve the accuracy of Varroa destructor infestation monitoring
- Project Advisor: Dr. Jonathan Engelsma School of Computing and Information Systems

For his Master's project, Matias researched various gesture recognition algorithms using an iPhone accelerometer. His focus was to develop a smartphone app that helps train apiculturists to monitor live honey bee colonies for varroa infestations. Entomologists have identified the varroa destructor, an external parasitic mite, as the number one threat to honey bee populations. The project was in collaboration with the GVSU Mobile Applications and Services Lab and a bee research scientist at Michigan State

University. In addition to his research, Matias has excelled in his CIS coursework, exhibiting a consistent passion for learning and strong work ethic that enables him to see his creative ideas carried through to fruition.

Jodie's project advisor, Dr. MacQuillan, writes she has sincerely enjoyed observing the development of Jodie's project and feels her research makes an important contribution to the field of maternal-infant nutrition through its exploration of barriers to breastfeeding among participants of the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC). Dr. MacQuillan states she has been continually impressed by the depth of understanding Jodie has for this topic, and this is clearly informed by her hard work reviewing the literature as well as her passionate interest. Jodie's research is important because it resulted in a finding that can be moved forward to advance the effectiveness of current interventions and also can inform future studies by pinpointing an area of research that has been neglected up to now.

 - Thesis Title: Anillin-like Mid1 cooperates with alpha-actinin for the cortical confinement of actin filaments during ring assembly in Schizosaccharomyces pombe
 - Thesis Committee: Dr. Dawn Hart (Chair) Department of Cell and Molecular Biology, Dr. Margaret Dietrich – Department of Biology/Cell and Molecular Biology, Dr. Brad Waller – Department of Chemistry, and Dr. David Zeitler – Department of Statistics

Sarah successfully completed her thesis and graduated at the conclusion of the Winter semester. Her thesis was selected to represent Grand Valley in the Biological/Life Sciences category as the nominee for the MAGS Distinguish Thesis Award.

Sarah's faculty advisor, Dr. Dawn Hart, stated that "Sarah's thesis project is unique for a Cell and Molecular Biology student in that it combines cell biology with advanced statistical analysis. With her thesis work, she also completed an independent study in the statistics department to advance her computational skill set. Her thesis aims to understand important mechanisms in cell division. Sarah is using the model organism fission yeast to understand how a protein called Mid1, which is required for equal division of one cell into two new cells, interacts with actin to ensure successful cell division. Cell division is a fundamental property of all cells. Therefore, Sarah's work has implications in many areas of cell biology and human disease."

ABSTRACT

In fission yeast, components of the actin cytoskeleton assemble into membraneanchored nodes that condense to form the actomyosin contractile ring. The contractile ring physically divides a cell into two genetically identical cells. Two essential elements of contractile ring assembly include actin polymerization at the division site and organization of the resulting filaments into a robust ring. Experimental research and computational modeling has shown that these two elements depend on the contribution of actin crosslinking and bundling proteins. Although the role of many key proteins have been identified in the assembly of the contractile ring, the mechanism that confines actin filaments to the cortex is not fully understood. Moreover, defects in cytoskeletal structures lead to various diseases, including cancer and neurological disorders. Similar to the actin binding domain (ABD) of Anillin, our lab has recently characterizedMid1 Pleckstrin Homology domain (Mid1PH) as a novel actin binding domain. Here, confocal microscopy is combined with published computational modeling to show that Mid1 provides additional roles, beyond recruitment and anchoring, as an actin bundling protein. Moreover, Mid1 cooperates with alpha-actinin to confine actin filaments to the cortex. During late stage ring assembly, Mid1 shows evidence as a potential collaborator with fimbrin to inhibit actin polymerization. These results contribute to the mechanistic assembly of an actomyosin contractile ring.

Geoffrey M. Kishbaugh, Master of Arts in English (Winter 2016)

- Thesis Title: Becoming Self: A Jungian Approach to Paradise Lost

Geoffrey successfully completed his thesis and graduated at the conclusion of the Winter 2016 semester. His thesis was selected to represent GVSU in the Humanities category as the nominee for the MAGS Distinguish Thesis Award.

Geoffrey's thesis committee chair, Dr. Benjamin Lockerd, stated "Geoffrey's thesis makes use of the concepts developed by the Swiss psychologist Carl Jung in an interpretation of John Milton's epic poem *Paradise Lost*. Through his analysis of the dreams of patients, as well as his study of world mythology, Jung identified certain "archetypes" that appear to be universal human symbols connected with stages of psychological individuation. Literary scholars have previously used Jung's archetypes in analyzing many different literary works, but very little has been previously said about Paradise Lost from this theoretical perspective – and, as this thesis shows, the one extended attempt to do so makes fundamental errors in applying the theory. Geoffrey's thesis is thus highly original in its application of Jungian concepts to the interpretation of the poem."

ABSTRACT

When addressing *Paradise Lost*, the reader is not encountering static characters but is interacting with and being acted upon by highly symbolic manifestations of the primitive condition of humanity's collective psyche. In dealing with the figures of Christianity's mythos, John Milton creates a text that stimulates the collective unconscious of the reader and draws out the primordial expressions of the *self*—archetypal manifestations. Subsequently, these manifestations are projected back onto the figures within the text and the reader engages in a dynamic relationship with the poem as both the reader and the figures of Adam and Eve experience the process of individuation alongside one another. Carl Jung's archetypal theory offers a comprehensive blend of psychology and cultural anthropology with which to observe the individuation process, a four-stage psychological journey that involves an encounter with three archetypal manifestations: the *shadow*, the anima(us), and the wise old man or great mother. Each of the predominant characters of the text act as an external projection of these internal psychological forms as the reader, along with Adam and Eve, encounters first the *shadow* in the form of Satan, next the *anima(us)* in the form of the contra-sexual other—Eve for Adam and Adam for Eve, and finally the wise old man or great mother who is simultaneously a representation of the self in the figure of the triune God. In the end, Adam and Eve achieve a state of individuated *self*-hood through the union of God with man, which is realized in the figure of the Christ. This image is the final manifestation of the reader's individuated *self*, a psychological state of internal and external harmony.
