Hello and welcome. My name is Aruna, and I am a staff member in the Graduate School at Grand Valley State University. At Grand Valley, we do our very best to ensure that our graduate students have as many resources as possible to help them succeed within their program. GVSU encourages the campus to embrace a social justice and intersectional identity approach to diversity, equity, and inclusion work. Therefore, the University has established four Social Justice Centers; The Gayle R. Davis Center for Women and Gender Equity, the Milton E. Ford LGBT Resource Center, the Office of Multicultural Affairs, and the Peter Secchia Military and Veterans Resource Center. Today we will be learning more about the Peter Secchia Military and Veterans Resource Center.

The Peter Secchia Military and Veterans Resource Center supports veterans, active military and reserves, and military spouses and dependents. This center is named after the late former Ambassador to Italy, philanthropist, and entrepreneur Peter F. Secchia. This was to honor his service and effort in Michigan's business and social work fields. According to the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency, Grand Valley was recognized as one of the top veteran-friendly schools in Michigan for the 10th consecutive year in 2024. This center helps veteran studentsfind the resources, programs, and community they need to achieve their academic goals at any stage of their lives.

Let's delve into the programs this center offers to the students. The GVSU Veterans Promise is one of the unique programs offered which ensures and saves a spot for veterans who have been enlisted in the military and have passed high school in Michigan. Grand Valley State University is the first university to offer this program in the entire nation. This program offers admission if you have committed to serve the nation for at least two years and are graduating from a Michigan high school. You can also defer your enrollment, if needed. This means that we'll look at your application materials now and provide you with an application decision, then hold your spot at GVSU until you're ready to enroll. Your willingness to commit to your country means something, and the least we can do is eliminate the worry about being accepted to college. Another program for veterans is the TRIO Veterans Upward Bound program which provides free academic support services to low-income veterans who want to complete degree programs. This program was started in 2018 and has served 125 Veteran students from low-income, first-generation veterans per year from Kent, Ottawa, Muskegon, and Allegan counties. Other programs are the Student Veterans Network, Peer Advisors for Veteran Education (PAVE), Michigan Veteran Entrepreneur Lab, and Military Police Basic Training Program. The Student Veterans Network provides support for veterans, active service members, and dependents in successfully progressing to degree completion and moving on to post-military careers. Peer Advisors for Veteran Education is a peer support program that connects incoming GVSU student veterans with other student veterans who are trained as Peer Advisors. These "mentors" help new students navigate college life, address challenges they may face, refer them to appropriate resources on and off campus, and provide ongoing support.
